



ADVOCATE FOR HUMAN RIGHTS: DANIEL G. HILL

Daniel Grafton Hill came to Canada from the United States hoping to find less discrimination and more acceptance. What he did find was that, although Canada during the late 20th century was considered more accepting, there still existed a lot of prejudice and a more covert type of racism. For example, he and his wife encountered difficulty finding a place to rent and found that landlords would lie about availability once they would meet with him. But Hill came with a determination to create a better life for himself, his family and Black communities and equal opportunities for everyone.

Having graduated from the University of Toronto with a PhD in social work earlier, in 1962 he was appointed the first director of the Ontario Human Rights Commission (OHRC) and later, the Chairman.

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In this role, he took the time to actually get to know the people who filed complaints and as a result, established bonds and became loved by many. In 1973, after serving for many years for the OHRC, he left to start his own business, Daniel G. Hill & Associates, which was the first of its kind in Canada. Hill, along with his associates, provided advice to many, including the Government of Ontario and the City of Toronto. Hill also published a book, *The Freedom Seekers: Blacks in early Canada*," in 1981, which quickly became very popular. In 1984, he became the Ombudsman for Ontario.
